When the park was established in 1980, it was a narrow strip along the Franklin River joining the Southwest National Park to Cradle Mountain Lake St Clair National Park. Because the area was bounded by these parks and to the east by Mt Field National Park, it became known as the "Hole in the Donut". In 1990, much of the Hole in the Donut was included into the expanded Franklin-Gordon Wild Rivers National Park and the name fell into disuse.</p> <p>The area is a rarely visited, rugged wilderness. Much of it is ridges, mountains, and untouched river valleys. It is virtually trackless and has a deserved reputation for having thick scrub that impedes walkers' progress. The dominant scrub species include <i>Melaleuca</i> spp., <i>Leptospermum</i> spp., and <i>Banksia marginata</i> which are often tangled with <i>Bauera rubioides</i>. There are some parts with buttongrass (<i>Gymnoschoenus sphaerocephalus</i>). The area includes several mountain ranges, the most significant being The Spires, The Pleiades, and the Denison Range as well as an unnamed range incorporating Shining Mountain, Conical Mountain, and Mt Curley. These ranges are folded quartzitic rocks, schists, and conglomerates. They</p>

				were glaciated giving rise to spectacular topography including lakes and tarns. The mountain tops and higher ridges hold alpine vegetation. A few of the lakes have small pockets of remnant rainforest forest featuring King Billy Pine ( <i>Athrotaxis selaginoides</i> ) and Fagus ( <i>Nothofagus gunnii</i> ).
