BEEFLES Dr. Thyne reports "This summer was a very happy one for Christmas Beetles (*Choerocoris Paganus*). Why? Because Native Hope (*Dodonea Viscosa*) had a wonderful flowering season. Last summer it did not flower at all, and so no lovely beetles. For weeks all stages of development were seen - from minute to full size beetles. "Mrs." was seen tugging "Mr." obediently but backwards after her for days on end. Many drying moulted cases could be seen attached to grass stems. Now they are hibernating. This exquisite little bug is not a pest as it lives on box, grasses and plantains."

REVERIE High up at the top of Sargison City (33, Mortimer Ave.) one recent Saturday morning, waiting (characteristically) for a working bee to turn up (it had turned up the day before), we wondered what the thoughts would be of a Martian or Venusian who might visit Earth in a couple of hundred years, after Earth's inhabitants had all migrated to Mars or Venus, or wherever. No parrots, however, but quite a few of another species, the very rare Bourke parrot, also at one time considered to be about extinct.

Rugged and very colourful ranges surround Alice Springs and they change colour every hour. But no permanent water for miles; the lovely Todd river runs as merely a river of loose sand through a line of noble white-stemmed red gums."
