
FORWARD PROGRAMME



Did you know that sometimes you can tell the underlying rock type of an area by the type of peppermint gum which grows in that area? Eucalyptus pulchella tends to grow on dolerite (hence its prevelance in the Hobart area), Eucalyptus amygdalina on sandstone, and Eucalyptus tenuramis (tasmanica) on mudstone.

Did you know that there is quite a nice bed of marine fossils quite close to Hobart? The group includes fenestella, brachiopods etc and is relatively easy to break up. They are found near the big bend in Strickland Avenue and also up the stream. They are part of the Faulkner Group, and are coarse quartz siltstone.
